Introduction:

Greetings and welcome! What follows are descriptions of programs and support provided by John Jose, School Zero Waste Coordinator, on behalf of the <u>Central Vermont Solid Waste Management District</u> (CVSWMD).

On a basic level, CVSWMD supports schools in meeting <u>Act 148, Vermont's Universal Recycling Law</u> requirements, particularly for implementing systems for proper **"blue bin" recycling**, for diverting **food scraps** from trash cans, and for properly managing potentially **hazardous**, **campus-generated materials** (e.g.: electronic waste, paint leftovers, mercury-containing bulbs, etc.).

But beyond that, our programming and support also provides **tremendous opportunities for students**, not only in the **rich learning experiences** they are engaged in, but also in the **significant**, **positive contributions they make to their school community**.

Working with your teachers, staff, and students, we can **identify your school's needs**, then work with everyone to deliver the services CVSWMD provides to meet those needs.

What Happens to That Banana Peel? (Food Scraps as a Natural Resource)

This program supports classroom units with a focus on plants and life cycles. Students are introduced to food scraps as a natural resource for creating compost, etc.

1. Program opens with an interactive book reading





Compost! Growing Gardens from Your Garbage explains the cyclic nature of going from raising vegetables and flowers in a home garden, to eating the vegetables, to composting leftover food scraps, to using the compost to grow more flowers and vegetables, and so on. The story is told through a young girl whose family engages in backyard gardening and composting.

2. Students have the opportunity to meet & observe "red wigglers" (composting worms) feeding on food scraps in a worm bin.

3. Students get a hands-on experience, exploring a finished compost product & composting

worms.






4. The amazing relationship between humans, chickens, and compost is explored, as well as the importance of food scraps getting into food scrap pails and not trash cans.





5. Weather permitting, an outdoor investigation in search of "compost in nature" (decomposition) and decomposers and other small critters can take place in a school yard, garden area, etc.



Sorting It All Out! (Classroom and Cafeteria Waste Separation)

1. Program opens with an interactive book reading:









2. After book reading, a demo is provided for students how to separate classroom & cafeteria recycling, trash, and food scraps.



3. Practice w/ Sorting Kits: Students break out into small groups to practice their sorting skills with materials and receptacles, which are all provided.

4. Wrap-up:

- "Great job everyone, you are really super sorters!"

- Students receive "Super Sorter" Stickers







Six-inch recycling decal, which can be affixed to classroom recycling receptacle. Decals for trash cans and food scrap pails are also available.



Post-program Survey Question: How effective was the book reading, as an opener, in setting the tone for the rest of the program?

I was appreciative of the fact that John not only read the book but had a discussion on the students' level about it.

This was the perfect way to begin our learning! This is how I typically start a new unit of study as well (read aloud and then getting into the work that aligns with it).

The story was effective because you took the time to pause and ask questions and let the children share.

Great pace, great tone and great enthusiasm!



Additional K-1 Teacher Feedback:

Post-program Survey Question: Based on your observations and interactions with your students, how helpful was this program in enhancing their understanding of classroom waste separation and improving their ability to sort their classroom-generated waste?

One of my students commented that, "we are smarter now".

My students learned so much and immediately came into the classroom after learning from John and applied their new knowledge. We made a 'small scrap paper' envelope for small scraps of paper and the next morning they new immediately to rinse their yogurt cups and then recycle them. It has been so fun to observe!

The kids were eager to tell me at lunch how to sort their items! They are still questioning what can go where at times. This is a good thing! It means they want to do this and they want to do it well!
